### Around the cabin...

The Carver quilts discovered in storage were displayed on January 11, along with a presentation by fabric artist Evelyn Eason, who explained the story the pattern, threads, dyes and fibers tell about the quilts' past. The 1870 market wagon was also unveiled.

◀ This wicker rocking chair that once belonged to Mary Hattan was donated to the BCHS by descendant Becki Orrell. It's now located in the log cabin, and looking very 'at home' in its surroundings.



## New photo feature: Ready for your closeup?

Tips for using the portable photo frame: Stand close to the frame and position your camera to look through the heart-shaped cutout. Use it to take pictures of the historic structures, the scenery, or your friends — or all three!



A new feature has been added to the landscape at the Baker Cabin historic site. You might need to search to find it — look for a wooden-frame with a heart cutout. At first you might think it's just a nice ornament for the yard...but look again.

Baker Cabin volunteers saw heartshaped photo stations like this at viewpoints in Europe and knew we had a great subject for something similar right here in Carver, Oregon. The frame is built to be portable. You can take it anywhere on the property to capture a great view.

Position your camera close to the heart-shaped cutout looking at your subject through the hole, and your photo is nicely framed. Use it to take pictures of one of the historic structures or your friends in front of it.




# **Eagle Scout Project provides custom-built storage** and convenience for event signage

Our historic society goal is to preserve and maintain the Oregon Trail Pioneer site for the public benefit by sharing reminders of how generations before us lived and built our civilization.

The site is not staffed regularly, but the grounds are open to the public during daylight hours for self-guided tours. We also host events such as weddings, memorial, and scouting ceremonies. Communicating to visitors requires signage for things such as parking directions, hours of operation, or historic information.

In the past, our sandwich board signs were stored out-





Gavin Le of Troop 33 saw a solution and stepped up to meet it. With adult guidance, he proposed and designed a small storage shed to be located near the point of use, making it easier for site staff to move the signs around. The signs are protected and not deteriorated by weather or bugs. The shed also stores sandbags that help divert water



flow during periods of high runoff.

The design was only the beginning. As the project leader, Gavin worked to obtain material donations, led work crews, and tracked expenses and work

hours to document the effort from start to finish.

Gavin received his Eagle Scout award, reaching the highest level of achievement in Scouting. He is just one of more than 24 scouts to have applied their skills to Eagle projects here at Baker Cabin.
